Main Feature: Britten Day 2024

On 22 November, the School held its annual Britten Day commemorations to mark the 111th birthday of its namesake. A special assembly was provided in the Theatre for Year 7 scholars during Period 1, highlighting Britten's childhood in Lowestoft. Mr Mullender (careers) offered an insight into Britten's life, whilst Mr Cook (Head of Year 7) read excerpts of Britten's school reports. Head of Lower School, Mrs Armon, concluded the presentation with a closing speech. Afterwards, a number of specially selected Year 7 and Year 8 scholars accompanied Mr Mullender on the annual Britten Tour, which began at Britten's family home on Kirkley Cliff Road. The group then visited areas important to him during his life before concluding with the laying of flowers on his grave in Aldeburgh churchyard, continuing a school tradition dating back to 1978. 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Phone Policy

Scholars are not permitted to be in possession of a mobile phone, or any electronic device, during the school day. Any phone or device brought into school must be deposited with the relevant Year Teams promptly upon arrival and will be held in secure storage. The phone/device can then be collected at 3:15pm.

Any mobile phone or device found in possession of a scholar during the school day, including at break and lunchtime, will be confiscated and will only be returned after 3:15 to a parent or carer.



If parents or carers need to urgently contact their child, they should do so by communicating with the main school office on (01502) 582 312, whereupon a message will be relayed immediately.





Bicycle Safety

The School strongly recommends that scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a bicycle helmet and a lock.

Bicycle lights are required by LAW when using a public road in the dark or poor visibility.

Bicycles should NOT be ridden on the school site.

Cyclists are reminded of the importance of careful and considerate use of public roads, particularly to and from school, when vehicle traffic increases.

Under UK law, a bicycle is regarded as a vehicle and should be used responsibly.

Any cyclist can be stopped by a police officer for riding a bicycle recklessly on a road or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner under the Road Traffic Act (1991).

The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is £2,500.

Trip News

<u>Sicily Trip:</u> A group of Year 10 GCSE Geography scholars made a trip to Sicily during October to climb Europe's only active volcano. Natural History Museum Trip:

Year 7 scholars have supported their studies on tectonics with a visit to the Natural History Museum's Red Zone where they were able to look at the history of Earth, how tectonic plates are moving and what the impacts of this are. They were able to try out what it was like to be in the Kobe earthquake, which they all enjoyed.



Cadbury World Trip: Year 9 scholars recently

visited Cadbury World where, as well as eating far too much chocolate, they had a classroom session explaining the provenance of cocoa, together with the history of Cadbury and how the factory was so important to the local area.

Red House and Snape Maltings: For the week commencing 4 November, all Year 7 form groups and their tutors were able to visit the Red House in Aldeburgh, Benjamin Britten's home from 1957 to his death in 1976. Scholars were given guided tours of the house by members of Britten Pears Arts and were shown a wide array of Britten's personal possessions, including items from the Britten-Pears Archive relating to his childhood in Lowestoft. They were even able to see the room where Queen Elizabeth II once sat and had lunch with him. The visits concluded with a trip to Snape Maltings Concert Hall which Britten established in the 1960s for the Aldeburgh Music Festival. Mr Cook (Head of Year 7) extends his appreciation to all scholars for their maturity and excellent behaviour during their visits.



East Suffolk Youth Council: On Monday 9 December, scholars J. Pullinger, M. Davey and B. Roffey took part in the first ever East Suffolk Youth Council. As elected representatives from Benjamin Britten, they participated in motions and discussions on issues such as child mental health, bio-diversity and house building and planning in the local area, as well as voting for the first chair and vice chair of the Youth Council. In the coming weeks and months the Britten councillors will be canvassing scholars for thoughts and opinions for potential motions to raise at the next Council meeting in February. FROM MRS ARMON, HEAD OF LOWER SCHOOL

Parents & carers must advise the relevant year team of any planned absence (e.g. medical appointments) at least 24 hours in advance to enable school staff to complete the necessary paperwork in a timely manner. Without this notice, the School cannot guarantee that scholars will be ready for collection when required.

School Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a priority at the Benjamin Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury.

This duty of care is taken very seriously. All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed. Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through Social Ethics lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The School is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them on our procedures and practices when they arrive. Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person. The School aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

If you have any concerns and would like to discuss them with the safeguarding team in the strictest of confidence, please contact Mrs Thurbon or Mr George, the school's Designated Safeguarding Leads.

Uniform Policy

<u>Footwear</u> - Formal black shoes, with a leather upper, of a safe and comfortable style and heel height. Those that look like boots/trainers or are made of canvas, or have flashes of colour are not acceptable.

<u>Jewellery</u> - Jewellery is not part of the uniform. Small sleeper type earrings or small discreet studs may be worn, no bigger than a 5 pence piece (one in each ear). No nose studs, facial or body piercings are permitted. *This includes plastic stud retainers*.

<u>Hair</u> - Hair should be of natural colour and style.

<u>Make-up</u> - Make-up is not permitted. This includes fake tan.

Nails - Nail varnish/false nails must not be worn.


Eyelashes - False eyelashes/eyelash extensions are not permitted.

<u>Coats and Hoodies</u> - Coats and hoodies must not be worn in school. They are to be removed as you enter the school building. Hoodies will be confiscated if seen being worn inside the building.

The School reserves the right not to accept scholars in school who exceed what the School deems reasonable.

News in Sport

Boys' Football

Mr Humphrey (P.E) is pleased to report the following successes in football over the past term:

- Year 7 Boys beat Sir Thomas Mills High School on a penalty shootout in the National Cup on 15 October. The score was 4-4 by the final whistle, so going to penalties, **Britten won 7-6.**
- The same team played a later match and resoundingly beat Debenham High School 7-4.
- Year 8 Boys beat Hartismere School 7-1 and will now play Pakefield High School in the next round.
 - Year 9 Boys beat Leiston High School in the National Cup, 4-1.
- The Britten team **narrowly lost 2-1 to Sir John Leman** and were also defeated by the same team at a later match in the County Cup.
 - Year 10 Boys beat Sir Thomas Mills High School 1-0 in the County Cup and will play Sybil Andrews School next.
 - Year 11 Boys have played three matches so far and despite a credible performance, went out of the County Cup, losing to Bungay High School.

<u>Open Evening Success</u>: It was a privilege to welcome over 400 prospective parents to the school for an exciting evening of demonstrations and taster sessions on the evening of 10 October. Music was provided by Performing Arts scholars while an array of different hands-on activities were provided by other departments. Thanks to all who assisted, including Prefects who acted as Tour Guides and Car Parking Stewards, and to members of the site team for helping set up. Feedback from parents was overwhelmingly positive and it is hoped that our younger visitors found much to entertain them.

Find My Future Trip: On Wednesday 27 November, twelve scholars travelled to the John Innes Centre, Norwich to take part in the Find My Future event. The day started off with a talk by Ian Russell, exploring Blown up Biology. Ian connected a microscope to a video camera and projector and demonstrated how to prepare a number of slides that included live specimens of Euglena, Volvox, Spirogyra, Paramecium, Amoeba, Hydra and Daphia. Ian then asked for a member of the audience to look at their living cheek cells. E. Willimott was the lucky volunteer and had her cheek cells displayed on screen for the audience to see. The scholars then had a second talk about illusions and how our brain can be tricked into seeing things that are not necessarily there. After this, scholars had an opportunity to interact with a number of STEM employers and to meet scientists from different areas of STEM to discuss their roles and how they entered the profession. The day concluded with a key note speaker Winnie Awa who talked about her career journey, from starting her career as a Software Tester to building an award-winning beauty-tech start-up. Her main themes for the audience were the importance of interdisciplinary thinking: How to blend disciplines by combining skills from different fields to innovate and solve problems and resilience and seeing challenges as opportunities.

Each workshop encouraged critical thinking, problem-solving and collaboration to enhance confidence in taking positive and impactful steps towards collective climate action. They had to communicate their ideas in front of different schools from the local area. The day ended with two local councilors summing up the challenges they faced in bringing climate action to their constituents.


