

Task 1 – Why did William want to conquer England?

supported. The Pope is God's representative on earth and now he has	
given me his blessing to become the King of England. There may be	
people who won't like this, but with God and the Pope on my side, who	
can argue with me?!

Task 2 – Where should you build your castle?


After William defeated Harold at the Battle of Hastings his next task was to make the rest of England accept his authority.

These castles had several purposes:


- They made local people believe that the Normans were powerful and should not be challenged.
- They were the places people came to pay their taxes.
- They were the places where people were taken when they broke the law.
- They looked even more impressive as normal people's houses were small huts with one room made of wattle and daub (straw, sticks, mud, and sometimes animal poo!)
