Special Feature: Forty Years On

On Sunday 9 September, the Benjamin Britten School hosted a celebration marking forty years of service to the community. Former students and staff members were invited to revisit their old school and meet current students and staff, as well as receiving a tour showcasing the school's state-of-the-art equipment. Opened in September 1978, the Benjamin Britten School has proudly served the North Lowestoft area for four decades, and has equipped thousands of students with the knowledge and skills for life in the wider world, a record of which it is justly proud. Headmaster Mr McAtear has overseen a comprehensive programme of renovation and refurbishment in recent years and visitors to the event commented favourably on the quality of the work. Organisers of the event, Mrs Overy and Miss Banns, were very impressed with the turn-out and pleased to see so many once-familiar faces walking the corridors again. Many retired members of staff also attended, including the first Headmistress of the school, Miss Gillian Smith, who made headlines in 1978 as the first woman to be appointed head teacher of a school in the East Suffolk area and who remained with the school for a decade. Miss Smith met another former Head teacher, Mr Mike Pinner and the current headmaster, reflecting on changes to the school and education as a whole. Old friends and colleagues had much to reflect on as old school photographs and yearbooks proved a particular favourite among the guests. Linking the school's past to its future, current scholars from the Performing Arts Department gave two short montage shows in the Theatre which was followed by an excerpt written by Benjamin Britten for the piano. A celebratory cake was also provided by the school which Mr McAtear and Miss Smith cut together (see below). A large amount of school memorabilia was loaned for the event by former students and staff which helped contribute to the pleasant sense of nostalgia on the day. The Benjamin Britten School would like to thank all who contributed and we look forward to another forty years serving the families of Lowestoft.

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Year Group News

The Year 7 Settling-In Evening was held on 18 October and provided an opportunity for parents/carers to meet with their child's Form Tutor and reflect on the first half term at Benjamin Britten. Bicycle Safety

It is strongly advised that all scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a **suitable bicycle helmet**.

Bicycle locks are also recommended in order to securely store bicycles once on the school site.

Under the **Road Vehicles Lighting Regulations (2009)** it is a **legal requirement** for the following items to be fitted to a bicycle in use on the public roads in the dark, at night, or in poor visibility: a front lamp showing a **white light, facing forwards**. A rear lamp showing a **red light, facing rearwards**. A rear **reflector, coloured red**, should be positioned facing rearwards; a **white reflector** should be positioned facing forwards. **Amber pedal reflectors**, should be fixed to the front and rear of each pedal.

Scholars are **expected** to ride their bicycles in **a responsible and considerate manner at all times**. This is of particular importance around peak travel time at 8:30am and 3:30pm, as pavements and roads approaching the school become busier. Accordingly, **bicycles are not to be ridden on the school site.**

Sanctions will be imposed on any scholar who is deemed to be **riding irresponsibly** or in a manner that poses a risk to themselves, other scholars or members of the public.

Any cyclist can be stopped by the **police** for **riding a bicycle recklessly on a road or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner** under the **Road Traffic Act, 1991**.

This can result in a prosecution.

The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is **£2,500**.

Jeans for Genes Day: A non-uniform day was held across the school on Friday 20 September in aid of children who live with a genetic disorder and the charity campaign **Jeans for Genes** which supports them. This resulted in a fantastic **total of £800.10**, all of which will be donated to the charity. Well done and thanks to all who took part. 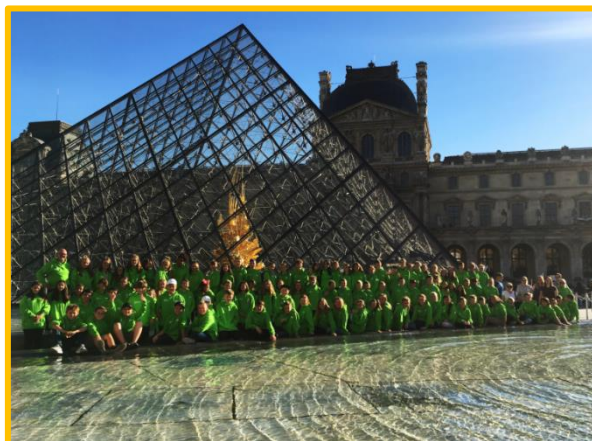
Trip News

Year 8 Paris Trip: The school took 100 Year 8 scholars on a four-day trip to Paris accompanied by ten members of staff. The group stayed at the Hotel Explorers and then made three day trips:

Day 1: The group began at the Eiffel Tower and The Louvre where scholars had the opportunity to visit the top of the Eiffel Tower. The views across the city were incredible and the weather perfect for seeing the whole capital. We had lunch in the park around the Eiffel Tower and then proceeded to the Louvre Art Gallery. This was an incredibly large gallery set in an old palace which houses the world-famous Mona Lisa painting. We spent two hours seeing as much of the art work, sculptures and displays as possible. It was a great reflection on the group that they all made it back to the meeting point by the appointed time – this was amazing considering how much of a maze the Louvre is for visitors.

Day 2: The Science Museum and River Seine Boat Trip – we visited the biggest science museum in Europe with displays ranging from space exploration to the ecology of natural systems. One of the best parts of the museum was the Planetarium, where we were able to see all the stars of the night sky in constellations. The group then proceeded to the River Seine where we travelled for 80 minutes up and down the river passing the Eiffel Tower, Notre Dame Cathedral, the Louvre and many famous bridges such as Pont Neuf. Scholars had a choice of buffet food and were able to relax using the hotel facilities including the 6D Cinema, outdoor play area and the ever-popular splash pool with slides and giant waterfall.

Day 3: Disneyland Paris – Scholars had a full day visiting both Universal Studios in the morning and Disney Park in the afternoon. The final meeting of the group was just before the spectacular Disney firework display which was amazing – a great way to end and celebrate an incredible trip to Paris. The 100 Year 8s were a credit to the school, their teachers and their parents; certainly one of the best groups we have ever taken abroad! They can be justifiably proud of the way they conducted themselves and how they represented the school. School Safeguarding

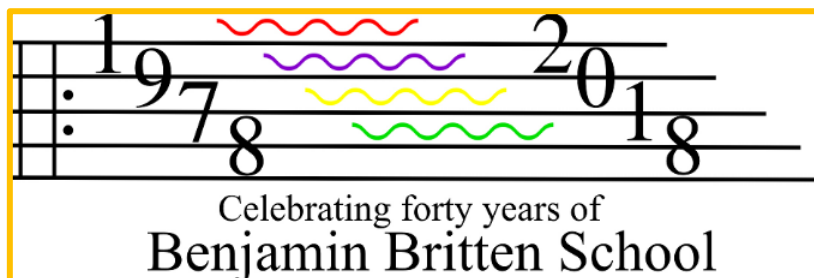
Safeguarding is a priority at the Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury. **This duty of care is taken very seriously.** All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed. Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through S.E lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The school is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them about our procedures and practices when they arrive at the school.

Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person. The school aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

Careers News

Motivational Speaker: On Tuesday 2 October, we were privileged to be visited by acclaimed motivational speaker, Cameron Parker. Cameron spoke to both Year 10 and Year 11 scholars about the obstacles they may encounter during this stage of their educational journey and the simple and effective strategies they may apply to overcome these barriers. Cameron touched on issues such as mental health, peer pressure, family life, self-confidence and self-motivation, using his own story as the basis to demonstrate how, despite sometimes facing significant obstacles, young people have the opportunity to draw upon their own inner strength as well as the support around them to dictate their own pathway and achieve the future they really want. A number of scholars contacted Cameron after the sessions via social media, to thank him for inspiring them to push forward and take responsibility for their learning and their future direction. The school would like to thank Cameron for taking the time to talk to our students and Jo Hand from Take your Place for helping to organise the event.



Year 11 Careers Appointments: All Year 11 scholars have received one-to-one careers appointments this half-term to determine their next step after secondary schools and kick-start the process of applying to college. A 'one page profile' has been created for each student so that they know the next steps they need to take as well as lots of advice around college, university and writing personal statements. A reminder that scholars should look to submit their **first application by the end of the October half term** and to keep an eye on the school's website and Facebook for any upcoming trips, events and workshops they may find useful or relevant to their chosen pathway.

Assemblies: Year 11 scholars have had assemblies delivered to them by Lowestoft Sixth Form and National Citizen Service this half term. Next half-term, they will receive assemblies from East Norfolk Sixth Form and East Coast College, with a number of other further education providers and industry specialists also booked in to speak to students in the New Year. Year 9 will receive an assembly from Jo Hand, talking about the school's involvement in the Take your Place programme and this will be followed up by a letter home, www.takeyourplace.ac.uk. They will also be taking part in an **Enterprise Day on Monday 5 November, with young entrepreneur Kieran Miles.**

Year 11 trip to East Coast College: On Friday 5 October, a group of Year 11 scholars visited an **Open Day at East Coast College**, having already attended similar events at **Lowestoft Sixth and East Norfolk Sixth** in the summer term. The day consisted of 'taster sessions' across a variety of subjects and a tour of college facilities. A trip to **Easton and Otley College** will also be arranged for those scholars who have expressed an interest in agriculture or animal studies; more information will be made available next half term.

National Citizen Service Autumn Programme: The programme due to take place over the October half-term has been postponed to allow more Year 11 scholars to participate in this amazing opportunity (you have to be over 16 to take part), dates to be confirmed soon. The Britten Piano: The school recently received a donation in the form of a Challen Piano once owned and used by Benjamin Britten. Mr David Burroughs, a retired music teacher, had purchased the piano a number of years ago from Morling's House of Music, which had traded on London Road South. Mr Burroughs was looking for a second-hand piano and Miss Morling offered the piano at a reduced rate as it had been previously owned. Miss Morling explained that the piano had originally been bought from Morling's by Benjamin Britten, who had wanted a small piano from which he could both play and conduct whilst composing at Snape Maltings in the late 1960s. Morling's had bought the piano back from Britten when he had finished with it and now, as a result of Mr Burroughs' generosity, we can all share in Britten's legacy.

The Memory Walk project helps to raise awareness of dementia on behalf of the charity Alzheimer's Research UK who have over 3,000 volunteers sign up each year to help hundreds of walks take place around the country. The Britten School takes this opportunity to congratulate Jasmine and Layla for their kindness and generosity in supporting this important event.

Instrument Festival: From 29 October all Year 7 scholars will be involved in the Learn an Instrument Festival, alongside other workshops taking place at the school.
