Main Feature: Success for Britten School Equestrian Team

The School's newly-established equestrian team had two fantastic showings recently. Firstly, at their debut on 18 December, they made a spectacular start, delivering an outstanding performance, and **taking first place in both the 70 and 80 classes** – an outstanding achievement for their first outing as a team. Then, on 8 March, scholars E. Allard-Watson, P. Howes, D. Casson and F. Leech competed in the NSEA Forest Edge at Swaffham, Norfolk. The team rode wonderfully and won their 70 class which means the **Benjamin Britten Team has qualified for the National Championships in October**. D. Casson performed admirably, taking 1st and 2nd place individually and qualifying for the National Championships. F. Leech rode a creditable round too, finishing 6th individually and also qualifying for the National Championships. The whole School congratulates them on their resilience, tenacity and teamwork and wishes them the very best for the October competition.

Mathematics News

UKMT Maths Challenge: The UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge took place for Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 scholars on 28 January. 39 Britten scholars took part and achieved **4 Golds, 17 Silvers and 8 Bronze certificates** over the three year groups.

Three scholars, namely H. Calver, E. Grundy and J. Edwards, were invited to participate in the follow-on rounds, which are reserved for the top 1% of participants nationally. These results will be published after the Easter break.

The Junior UKMT Challenge will take place on 29 April for Year 7 and Year 8 scholars. Information has been given out to scholars via assembly and email, and parents have been informed of signing their children up to the event. Alternatively, scholars can speak with Mr Locke in Maths Room 7 and sign-up in person.

The UKMT Team Challenge: On 2 March, scholars from Benjamin Britten travelled to Woodbridge School for the UKMT Team Challenge, where thirteen schools participated. The event consisted of four rounds: Group, Shuttle, Cross Number and Relay.

Z. Aldred, H. Calver, H. Rutter and E. Willimott competed valiantly and though not achieving a top-three place to progress to the national finals, their eighth place finish outscored scholars from Hartismere, our sister school. Mr Locke congratulates these four scholars for representing Benjamin Britten at regional level.

Trip News

Krakow Trip: From 11-13 March, over forty Year 9 scholars took part in their first overseas trip with the School. After a very early start, and a long day travelling, they arrived in the former royal capital of Krakow in southern Poland. There they explored the Old Town, Wawel Castle and Cathedral, and finally ended the day with a few games of pinball at the Pinball Museum. On the second day, the group made a moving visit to Auschwitz, where scholars were incredibly respectful and reflective. After returning to



Krakow, the tour concluded with a visit to the Hard Rock Café for lunch, followed by an afternoon of activities in the city centre, a few rounds of bowling, and a chance to try traditional Polish pierogi. Staff congratulate our scholars on representing the School in such a mature and thoughtful manner.



Holocaust Memorial Day: On Tuesday 27 January, the Head Girl and Head Boy attended the annual Holocaust Memorial Day commemoration event held at Lowestoft Railway station. The theme this year was 'Bridging Generations' and scholars joined representatives from the local council and students from Ormiston Denes to deliver readings from survivors and victims of the Holocaust. Scholars were then invited to lay a wreath in memory of the 500 unaccompanied Jewish children who were rescued from the Nazis and who arrived by train on the Kindertransport in Lowestoft in 1938. Many of their parents were later killed in Nazi concentration camps. Guest speaker Diana Cook, whose mother had survived the Holocaust as an evacuated child, but whose grandparents were killed by the Nazis, spoke of the importance of confronting prejudice and intolerance in modern society. She emphasised the need for empathy in our communities and towards our neighbours and appealed to young



people to practise lives underscored by kindness and tolerance and to be wary of misinformation that is used to divide people and stoke hatred. The entire School congratulates O. Bagshaw and H. Boggis for their maturity and professionalism.

Trip News

Geography Field Trips:

This term, scholars across the Geography Department have taken their learning beyond the classroom through a variety of engaging fieldwork and extra-curricular opportunities. Year 7 explored urban land use in the local area, investigating how well it aligns with the '15-minute city' model by identifying key services and amenities within walking distance. Year 8 focused on sustainability on site, collecting data on energy use and surveying litter to better understand environmental impacts and responsibility. Our Year 10 GCSE scholars have been particularly busy: they conducted a land use transect in Norwich to examine patterns in urban structure, investigated coastal management strategies in Southwold (pictured), and explored the regeneration of the Olympic Park, considering the social, economic, and environmental impacts of large-scale redevelopment. These hands-on experiences have helped scholars develop essential geographical skills while deepening their understanding of real-world issues. In addition to the fieldwork Year 8 explored Africa Alive with a focus on species adaptation whilst Year 9 visited Jimmy's Farm.



Romeo & Juliet Trip:

On Wednesday 18 March, scholars from Year 10 and Year 11 attended a performance of Romeo and Juliet at the Marina Theatre, Lowestoft, accompanied by their teachers: Mrs. Sweetman, Mrs. Wright, Mrs. Snowdon, Mrs. Swan and Miss Gardener. This was a wonderful opportunity for our scholars to see a live-action performance in preparation for their GCSEs, complete with clashing sword fights and all the emotion that this tragic tale is famous for. The scholars were impeccably behaved and Mrs. Sweetman (English) would like to extend her thanks to staff who attended the trip and parents who supported it.

London Trip:

From 3-4 March, over sixty Year 7 scholars visited London and stayed overnight. During their visit they were treated to a ride on the London Eye, had a meal at Pizza Express and enjoyed a stage performance of 'Wicked' at the Apollo Theatre. To round off their day, they also had a tour of the Wembley Stadium (pictured) followed by a visit to the Natural History Museum to look at dinosaur skeletons. School Notices

Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a priority at Benjamin Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury.

This duty of care is taken very seriously. All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed. Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through Social Ethics lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The School is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them on our procedures and practices when they arrive. Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person.

The School aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

If you have any concerns and would like to discuss them with the safeguarding team in the strictest of confidence, please contact Mrs Thurbon or Mrs Armon, the school's Designated Safeguarding Leads.

Uniform Policy

Footwear - Formal black shoes, with a leather upper, of a safe and comfortable style and heel height. Those that look like boots/trainers or are made of canvas, or have flashes of colour are not acceptable.

Jewellery - Jewellery is not part of the uniform. Small sleeper type earrings or small discreet studs may be worn, no bigger than a 5 pence piece (one in each ear). No nose studs, facial or body piercings are permitted. *This includes plastic stud retainers.*

Shirts and Kilts: Shirts should be tucked in, top button fastened and kilts worn to knee length.

Make-up and nails - Make-up, including fake tan, nail varnish/false nails are not allowed.

School Jumper: Should be worn at all times unless staff allow it to be removed.

Eyelashes - False eyelashes/eyelash extensions are not permitted.

Coats and Hoodies - Coats and hoodies must not be worn in school. Hoodies will be confiscated if seen being worn inside the building.

Philanthropy News

Non-Uniform Day: On 9 March, to mark World Book Day, the School held a non-uniform day to raise money for five charities: *Comic Relief*, *Strut Safe* (the Visual Arts Department's chosen charity), *Anne Frank Trust UK* (the History Department's chosen charity), *Lowestoft and District Deaf Society* (the Year 7 Team's second chosen charity), *Scope UK* (the Year 11 Team's chosen charity), and *Pulmonary Fibrosis Trust*. Britten 200 Project: Benjamin Britten School has been working over several years to raise money for 100 different charities, both local and national, to reaffirm the need for big hearts and sharp minds in our scholars and to exemplify our school motto, 'Discamus ut Serviamus' ('we learn that we may serve'). So successful has the Britten 100 been, that the School is now moving to include a further 100 charities, marking the Britten 200 Project, which will launch later in the year.

The day was received positively by all Youth Councillors, with many feeling inspired to continue championing young people's voices both locally and nationally. Jess Asato MP said, *"It was fantastic to welcome East Suffolk Youth Council to Parliament and to see their curiosity first-hand.
