Main Feature: Armistice Day 2023

The school came together for its annual Armistice Day event on 8 November, which was held in the Theatre in front of fifty parents and carers who joined scholars in paying their respects for all those who fought and died in war. The event was also attended by over twenty members of cadet branches and other uniformed groups, who were given special permission to attend school in the uniform of their respective group. Mrs Armon (Head of Upper School) led the commemoration, while Head Girl L. Picken gave readings, supported by a team of Senior Prefects. The event was concluded with a two minute silence, preceded by the laying of a wreath on behalf of the whole school. Year 7 Performing Arts scholars, B. Gabriel and D. Simms, gave stirring solo performances while Food Tech scholars provided refreshments, including specially made ANZAC Biscuits, following an original recipe from the First World War. On Remembrance Sunday, Head Boy (A. Clark) and Head Girl (L. Picken) also attended Lowestoft's Remembrance Sunday parade, recited a poem and laid a wreath on behalf of the school. They were accompanied by Mrs Thurbon (Head Teacher) and Mrs Armon (Head of Upper School). Other scholars also attended the Remembrance Sunday parade on behalf of their respective uniformed groups. The School congratulates all who took part and extends its appreciation to the families who attended the Armistice event and to Mr Challis (Head of Year 7) who acted as official photographer.





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Phone Policy

Scholars are not permitted to be in possession of a mobile phone, or any electronic device, during the school day. Any phone or device brought into school must be deposited with the relevant Year Teams promptly upon arrival and will be held in secure storage. The phone/device can then be collected at 3:15pm.

Any mobile phone or device found in possession of a scholar during the school day, including at break and lunchtime, will be confiscated and will only be returned after 3:15 to a parent or carer.

If parents or carers need to urgently contact their child, they should do so by communicating with the main school office on

Bicycle Safety

The School strongly recommends that scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a bicycle helmet and a lock.

Bicycle lights are required by LAW when using a public road in the dark or poor visibility.

Bicycles should NOT be ridden on the school site.

Cyclists are reminded of the importance of careful and considerate use of public roads, particularly to and from school, when vehicle traffic increases.

Under UK law, a bicycle is regarded as a vehicle and should be used responsibly.

Any cyclist can be stopped by a police officer for riding a bicycle recklessly on a road or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner under the Road Traffic Act (1991).

The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is £2,500.





Britten Day 2023

Britten Day Commemorations: On 22 November, the School held its annual Britten Day commemorations to mark the 110th birthday of its namesake. A special assembly was provided in the Theatre for Year 7 scholars during period 1, highlighting Britten's childhood in Lowestoft. Mr Mullender (careers) offered an insight into Britten's life, whilst Mr Challis (Head of Year 7) read excerpts of Britten's school reports. Mrs Armon concluded the presentation with a closing speech. Afterwards, a number of specially selected Year 7 scholars accompanied Mr Mullender on the annual Britten Tour, which began at Britten's family home on Kirkley Cliff Road. The group then visited areas important to him during his life before concluding with the laying of flowers on his grave in Aldeburgh churchyard, continuing a school tradition dating back to 1978. They were also able to view the stained glass window in Aldeburgh church created by John Piper in memory of Britten. Whilst at the church, a member of Britten-Pears Arts (who as a child had sung for 'Mr Britten') congratulated scholars for marking Britten's birthday with flowers and congratulated them on their conduct and maturity. Scholars who accompanied the tour were L. Knights, G. Law, J. Nichols, S. Callow, A. Harper, J. Kill, L. Murray, P. Dewsnap, S. Bland and H. Beaumont-Smith. The School congratulates all who took part for their maturity and to Mr Temple for driving the minibus.

Trip News

Red House and Snape Maltings: From 25-29 September, all Year 7 form groups and tutors were treated to guided tours of the Red House and Snape Maltings, the former being provided by guides from the Britten-Pears Foundation, the charitable organisation responsible for managing Britten's estate and musical legacy. Tours also included parts of Snape usually off limits to members of the public. Whilst there, scholars were able to handle some of Britten's personal possessions (see below) Mr Challis extends his appreciation to all scholars for their impeccable behaviour and thanks all staff who supported the trips. The Red House was the home of Benjamin Britten when he moved out of Lowestoft, whilst Snape Maltings is the world-famous concert hall he created as part of the Aldeburgh Festival, which is still held annually, attracting musicians and performers from around the world.









Africa Alive: On 21 November, 45 Year 8 scholars were invited to attend a geography field trip to Africa Alive, under the supervision of Mrs Kitching (geography). The visit was in support of learning completed in class on the different ecosystems in Africa. Scholars were able to look at many different adaptations and even got to touch reptiles and an African snail. Mrs Kitching congratulates all involved for their attentiveness and good behaviour.




<u>Sicily Trip:</u> Mr Flanagan and Mrs Kitching (Geography) recently led a trip to Sicily for Year 11 GCSE Geography scholars. Mr Flanagan reports: "Our flight arrived into Catania with stunning views of Mount Etna. We went straight to Alcantara Gorge where we were able to try out the local pizza and have a walk through the gorge. Lots braved the cold river water for a paddle to the basalt caves!

On Day Two we visited Mount Etna, Lava Cave and the Museum of Etna.

Day Three saw a last minute upgrade to our itinerary in Ionian Sea snorkelling.

Scholars were amazed at how clear the water was and they were able to observe fish and the basalt landforms. We were proud that a number of fears were overcome for what was a first for the majority. The afternoon took us to Taormina. After a visit to the ancient (Greek and Roman) theatre students were able to explore the pretty town.

Day Four saw a stop at Tindari - a nature reserve where we walked between fresh water lakes and the Tyrrhenian Sea. Different currents have created a spit and we walked the length of this in glorious sunshine. On the top of the cliffs here was the Sanctuary of Tindari. This is an ancient place of pilgrimage and some scholars and Mr Flanagan took the old pilgrims' route up the trail whilst the rest took the coach! Next stop was the Cyclops Riviera at sunset. More coastal features here with the basalt stacks in the sea. There was time for a final dinner with our 'Sicily family' and a final pizza party before packing ready for home." Cadbury World: On 15 November, 43 Year 9 scholars, accompanied by Mrs Kitching (geography) enjoyed a visit to Cadbury World in Birmingham. Scholars were able to explore the provenance of cocoa and how to make chocolate, whilst understanding the environmental impact of cocoa growing. The group also enjoyed a workshop which explained the history of the company and brand, and talked about the importance of Fairtrade, all of which supported current lessons about development and globalisation. The day was concluded with a much anticipated chocolate tasting event. Congratulations to all scholars who took part.



Whitlingham Adventure Park: From 11-15 September, as part of their transition to secondary school, new Year 7 scholars had the chance to visit the Whitlingham Adventure Park near Norwich with their tutors for team-building activities. School Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a priority at the Benjamin Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury.

This duty of care is taken very seriously. All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed. Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through Social Ethics lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The School is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them on our procedures and practices when they arrive. Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person. The School aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

Mock Trial Success: On Saturday 18 November, for the very first time, Year 11 scholars participated in a Court Bar Mock Trial at Norwich Crown Court organised by Young Citizens, a charity aimed at widening access to careers and knowledge of the British legal system. Our scholars participated as Court Clerks, Court Ushers, Witnesses, Defendants and Barristers against five other teams, with real Crown Court Judges overseeing the proceedings; namely, His Honour Anthony Bate, Her Honour Katherine Moore, and Her Honour Alice Robinson, respectively. This is something that Year 11s have been preparing for the last few weeks, with



the help of Mrs Cator (English) and Miss Holdsworth (English). Britten scholars were the youngest team in the mock trial, battling against law students from East Coast College, Sir John Leman Sixth Form College, Wymondham College, St Clements and Ken Stimpson Academy. Thanks to the organisation of our Court Clerk (L. Picken) and Usher (F. Leith) and the decisions made by our jurors in different cases, O. Gibbs, A. Carter, P. Gabriel and L. Davies, the day ran smoothly, and the trials were seamlessly executed. The jurors were swayed by the convincing performances made by our witnesses, S. Timtey, E. Lewis, S. Crittenden and most notably V. Wood, who stood her ground while enduring a brutal cross-examination. Finally, the preparation and confident delivery of detailed opening and closing speeches, alongside careful examination in-chief questioning and intense cross-examinations by barristers, J. McAllen, C. Woodger, C. Packer, A. Winney, and R. Everitt, all of whom were superb! They mastered court etiquette and showed some really responsive questioning skills. J. McAllen, who acted as a barrister for more than one case, was imposing and ruthless in his pursuit of justice! Our team's herculean effort paid off, winning two out of three cases, managing to succeed in both prosecuting and defending the same defendant, bagging them 3rd place, beating East Coast College, Sir John Leman Sixth Form and Ken Stimpson Academy. A massive congratulations to all involved and a special thanks to our minibus driver, Mr Temple, for giving up his Saturday to take scholars to Norwich. The English Department is hoping to create more fantastic opportunities for any Year 10 scholars interested in a career in law or legal career, acting or public speaking, by holding our own in-house trial in preparation for next year. 
