Main Feature: Year 10 GCSE Poland Trip

From 4 to 6 March, a group of 32 Year 10 GCSE History scholars flew to Krakow in Poland where, amongst other things, they ventured 130m underground to explore the Wieliczka Salt Mine, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, where they were able to marvel at the array of delicate carvings and decorations all crafted from the naturally occurring salt, which was mined continuously from 1363 to 1996. One of the most striking moments came from visiting the St. Kinga Chapel and seeing the salt crystal chandelier. Scholars descended through a 3.5-kilometre long tourist route which took them past chapels, lakes, and original mining equipment. Afterwards, the group visited Schindler's Museum and were later able to visit the Auschwitz concentration camp for a sobering and moving examination of the events leading up to the Holocaust, and the horrific stories of suffering that went on behind its barbed wire fences. Mr Barber (History) extends his appreciation to all who participated and congratulates scholars on their excellent behaviour, maturity and willingness to ask questions.

Trip News

Norfolk Lakes Residential: From 10-13 March, over 70 Year 7 scholars participated in a two-day residential trip at Manor Adventures in Norfolk. During the trip, they engaged in various activities that challenged their problem-solving abilities, teamwork, and resilience. Archery tested the scholars' accuracy with arrows, and several managed to hit the bullseye! Raft building encouraged collaboration and communication as groups worked together to construct rafts and then put them to the test on the water. The blind trial required participants to rely on their communication skills to guide each other through an obstacle course while blindfolded. Survival skills activities included building shelters and starting campfires. Additional activities included canoeing, Manor Olympics, low ropes, a campfire, and a disco. Scholars thoroughly enjoyed their time on the trip and Mr Cook (Head of Year 7) congratulates them on their exemplary behaviour throughout the trip.

This included archery, raft-building, canoeing and enjoying an evening round the campfire.

<u>Geography Trips:</u> Year 7 scholars have started to look at the topic we call 'Off to the Coast' and the majority of the year group took part in a day exploring the coastal management in place between Corton and South Beach, Lowestoft. They were able to see the effects of longshore drift by examining beach material and then constructed their own defended settlement on the beach. Sadly all their settlements were affected by a tidal surge but many were well defended and survived it.

Year 10 GCSE scholars have completed their first compulsory fieldwork in Norwich where they looked at how land use and environmental quality changes between the suburbs and the city centre. This was followed up by collecting secondary data and analysing this in class. They also had the opportunity to support their learning of regeneration in London with a day visit to the Olympic Park.

Year 10 GCSE Geography scholars have also had the chance to experience a day at East Norfolk College where they had taster sessions in A-Levels in Geography, Geology and Environmental Science giving them a really good experience of what they will study at A level.

Holocaust Memorial Day: This year's Holocaust Memorial Day coincided with the 80th anniversary of the liberation of the infamous Auschwitz concentration camp in 1945. Head Girl J. Walker and Head Boy J. Pullinger represented the School at the commemoration event held at Lowestoft Station where they read a poem, 'Zog Nit Keynmol' ('Never Say') also known as the Hymn of the Partisans where they joined local councillors and the Mayor of Lowestoft in laying a wreath. They also led year group assemblies throughout the week, showing a presentation on the Holocaust which emphasised how we all have a responsibility counter dangerous rhetoric and racism in all forms.

<u>Charity Hair Cut:</u> On 26 January, Year 9 scholar **A. Cone raised over £300 for the Little Princess Trust** charity by having twelve inches of her hair cut off to raise awareness of young people experiencing cancer treatment. Her chosen charity, The Little Princess Trust, provides high-quality, real-hair wigs for young girls who have lost their hair through cancer treatment. The School joins together in congratulating her on her selflessness and kindness.

<u>Charity Sleep-Out:</u> On Friday 14 March, three Britten scholars took part in 'The Great Tommy Sleep Out' to raise money for the Royal British Legion. Army cadets and Britten scholars T. Sharples, C. Sharples and L. Murray completed the sleep-out which happened to take place during one of the coldest nights in March, raising over £200 for charity (see right). The whole School congratulates them on their dedication and perseverance.

BRAK Month: The School recently launched its annual BRAK Month (Benji's Random Acts of Kindness) both in school and the wider community. For every entry scholars submit, they will be entered into a prize draw. Mrs Armon (Head of Lower School) is looking forward to reading through all the entries once school resumes after the Easter break.

Mobile Phone Policy

Scholars are not permitted to be in possession of a mobile phone, or any electronic device, during the school day.

Any phone or device brought into school must be deposited with the relevant Year

Teams promptly upon arrival where it will be held in secure storage.

The phone/device can then be collected at 3:15pm.

The School reserves the right to confiscate any mobile phone/device found in possession of a scholar during the school day, including at break and lunchtime, and to only return the phone/device at 3:15pm to a parent or carer.



If parents or carers need to urgently contact their child, they should do so by communicating with the main school office on (01502) 582 312, whereupon a message will be relayed immediately.



Bicycle Safety

The School strongly recommends that scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a bicycle helmet. Bicycle locks are also recommended.

A reminder that bicycles should NOT be ridden on the school site.

All cyclists are reminded of the importance of careful and considerate use of the public roads, particularly to and from school, when vehicle traffic increases.

In law, a bicycle is regarded as a vehicle and should be used responsibly.

Any cyclist can be stopped by the Police for riding a bicycle recklessly on a road or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner under the Road Traffic Act (1991).



The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is £2,500.



School Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a priority at the Benjamin Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury.

This duty of care is taken very seriously. All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed. Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through Social Ethics lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The School is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them on our procedures and practices when they arrive. Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person. The School aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

Mathematics News

UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge: The UKMT Intermediate Challenge took place for Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 scholars earlier this year. For the most recent competition, Benjamin Britten fielded 52 entrants, **achieving 7 Gold, 9 Silver and 9 Bronze certificates over the three year groups.**Six scholars, namely J. Edwards, I. Smith, and O. Symonds in Year 10, and J. Pullinger, C. Simms and A. Thorn in Year 11, were invited into the follow-on round, known as the Pink Kangaroo, where results will be published after the Easter break.





Uniform Reminder

SHOES - Formal black shoes, with a leather upper, of a safe and comfortable style and heel height.

Footwear that looks like boots/trainers, or are made of canvas or have flashes of colour,

are not acceptable.

JEWELLERY - Small sleeper type earrings or small discreet studs may be worn, no bigger than a 5p coin (one in each ear). No nose studs, facial or body piercing is permitted.

This includes plastic stud retainers.

HAIR - Hair should be of natural colour and style.

MAKE-UP - Make-up is not permitted, including fake tan.

NAILS - Nail varnish/false nails must not be worn.

EYELASHES - False eyelashes and eyelash extensions are not permitted.

COATS & HOODIES - Coats and hoodies must not be worn in school. They are to be removed upon entering the school building. Hoodies will be confiscated if seen being worn inside.

The School reserves the right not to accept scholars in school who exceed what the School sees as reasonable.

Attention Parents

Parents/carers are reminded of the need to exercise consideration when parking in the local community while collecting their children from school.

Roads adjoining the School are residential areas that need to remain accessible at all times.
