Week 3: Programming Micro:Bits


The full instructions with functioning links and other helpful resources is available on Google Classroom under the subheading Homework in the Classwork tab.




Week 8: TinkerCAD

- If you aren't that confident just keep it simple and give it a go.
- If you are looking for more of a challenge you could try and search the YouTube or Instructables websites for a more advanced tutorial, make your own creation entirely or even try Fusion360 (It is free for personal use despite what the website appears to say just look for the personal use version.) the more advanced version of TinkerCAD!

If you loved making your product then you might want to have it made into a real thing! If this interests you Shapeways can actually 3D print your product for you from a variety of materials from plastic to metals (This is a paid service) https://www.shapeways.com/. The larger and more complex your product the higher the costs. Cost also varies dependent on the material chosen.

Figure 7 shows a loaded wheelbarrow.



Mechanical advantage (MA) is calculated by:

$$MA = \frac{load}{effort}$$

The velocity ratio (VR) is 4 and the effort is 100 N.

The efficiency of the system is given by:

Efficiency =
$$\frac{MA}{VR} \times 100\%$$

The system is 85% efficient.

Calculate the maximum load that can be lifted.
