Main Feature: Armistice Day 2021

The School came together to mark Armistice Day on 11 November, with a number of scholars electing to attend lessons in the uniforms of their respective organisation. Poppies were taken to form groups during morning registration to raise money for the Royal British Legion, while a Remembrance Event was held during Lesson Two to coincide with the two minute silence held at 11:00am. The event was held next to the Second World War pillbox on the middle field, with Mrs Thurbon (Assistant Headteacher) leading the commemoration, watched on by a respectful audience of over fifty scholars. Head Girl Sophie Siu led the readings, followed by Head Boy Henry Cole. A wreath from the Royal British Legion was laid and the two minute silence was marked at 11:00am, before the Deputy Head Boy concluded proceedings by reading the Kohima Epitaph. The School congratulates all who participated in the Remembrance Event and extends its sincere gratitude to all who have fought and served in the armed forces.

Mobile Phone Notice

A reminder to parents and carers that scholars are not permitted to be in possession of a mobile phone, or any electronic device, during the school day. Any phone or device brought into school must be deposited with the relevant Year Teams promptly upon arrival and will be held in secure storage.

The phone/device can then be collected at 3:15pm.

Any mobile phone or device found in possession of a scholar during the school day, including at break and lunchtime, will be confiscated.

It will only be returned at 3:15 pm to a parent or carer.

If parents or carers need to urgently contact their child, they should do so by communicating with the main school office on (01502) 582 312, whereupon a message will be relayed immediately.

Bicycle Safety

The School strongly recommends that scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a bicycle helmet.

Bicycle locks are also recommended. Bicycles should NOT be ridden on the school site.

Scholars who bring their bicycle to school during winter months are reminded that under the **Road Vehicles Lighting Regulations (2009)**it is a legal requirement for the following items to be fitted to a bicycle in use on the public roads at night or in reduced visibility:

- 1.) a front lamp showing a white light, facing forwards
- 2.) a rear lamp showing a red light, facing rearwards
- 3.) a rear reflector, coloured red, facing rearwards
- 4.) amber pedal reflectors, positioned to the front and rear of each pedal

Cyclists who ride in the dark without lights pose a risk to themselves, motorists and pedestrians.

Consequently, they can be subject to a Fixed Penalty Notice of £50 issued by the police.

Any cyclist can be stopped by a police officer for riding a bicycle recklessly on a road or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner under the Road Traffic Act (1991).

The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is £2,500.





Philanthropy News

Outreach on the Streets: As part of the School's philanthropic endeavours close to Christmas, scholars were invited to bring in tinned food, toiletries and first aid items in support of the collection for the charity Outreach on the Streets. This is a local organisation run by Mr Stacey Drennan and his dedicated team of volunteers, who spend many hours a week supporting the homeless and less fortunate in Lowestoft. A wreath was laid on behalf of all scholars and staff at Benjamin Britten School and Head Boy Henry Cole and Head Girl Sophie Siu were chosen to read the poem 'One Thousand Men are Walking' by Joshua Dyer, to the former soldiers, cadet groups, council officers and members of the public who had gathered to pay their respects. They were ably supported by the Deputy Head Boy and Deputy Head Girl and accompanied by Assistant Headteacher Mrs Thurbon. A two minute's silence was observed before a march past of uniformed services concluded the event which was very well attended.

School Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a priority at the Benjamin Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury. **This duty of care is taken very seriously.** All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed.

Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through Social Ethics lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The School is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them on our procedures and practices when they arrive.

Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person. The School aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

Careers News

Year 11 scholars have had the opportunity to attend a one-to-one careers interview to ascertain their plans once they leave Benjamin Britten. These interviews are important as they allow scholars to ask careers staff about the various options available to them when they leave school whilst finalising college applications and personal statements. Scholars have also been given prospectuses from local colleges and revision timetables to assist them with their work. Many scholars have already attended interviews for college and have been offered places for the next academic year.

After Christmas, scholars in Years 8 and 9 will begin their timetabled careers lessons, exploring different GCSE Option subjects, learning about adversity and overcoming setbacks, and how to use Unifrog, the school's new online careers platform.

And in Other News...

STEM Talent: Mr Snell (Science) reports that the Year 8 STEM Talent group has been undertaking a project to submit for a CREST award to celebrate STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Maths) achievement. They have been investigating how to make fizzy drinks and what different conditions are required to make the best drink. They have also explored careers related to manufacturing and chemical testing. They aim to achieve their award by the end of February. Furthermore, the Benjamin Britten Science Department have been awarding a scholar from any year group per teacher with Scientist of the Month where achievement and effort in science is celebrated and recognised. Scholars are awarded a badge and are displayed on the TV screens around the school.

<u>Literacy Success</u>: On 7 December Oscar Symonds (7DB) became the first scholar in Year 7 to read over one million words on the Accelerated Reader programme. He received a certificate and a £10 online shopping voucher. A book vending machine has also been set up in the School Library as a reward for progressing beyond 60 lessons on the Bedrock literacy programme. Instead of using money, scholars who complete 60 lessons are given a token which allows them to choose a book of their choice to keep from the vending machine. The first scholar to achieve this was Valentino Paolantonio (7KB).

<u>Scholar Success</u>: The School would like to congratulate former scholar Amy Adamson (leaver 2019) who has achieved the grades required at A-Level to take up a place studying Veterinary Sciences at Cambridge University. Also, former scholar Shay Jordan (leaver 2016) recently returned to the school as a visitor to observe lessons in readiness for his teaching career which will begin after the completion of his Masters in Mathematics at the University of East Anglia in Norwich.

Novel Writing Club: Each year in November, thousands of people worldwide participate in National Novel Writing Month, a challenge that asks participants to write a novel in 30 days. This year, the Novel Writing Club was created to meet this challenge. Hosted by Miss De Broe (English) and Miss Baumgartner (English) the club began in October and has seen a dozen scholars ranging from Year 7 to 11 planning their stories each Tuesday after school. They focused on integral parts of storytelling, like plot, character, and setting, all in preparation for 1 November. Over the last three months, these scholars have worked incredibly hard and set ambitious goals for themselves; as a club, they have written over 80,000 words! After the holidays, these scholars will return prepared to edit their stories, which will then be published in an anthology format and displayed in the School Library for others to enjoy.

Anime Club: Anime Club now officially has over 45 members! The club watches a variety of animes based on popular vote in each session, typically in Japanese with subtitles, and discusses characters and different genres/themes. Year 7s are welcome on Wednesdays after school (but is currently full to capacity), while Years 8-11 still have vacancies. Lapel badges are given to all members who attend and the club is now looking to extend to more cultural experiences.

<u>Debating Society:</u> The inaugural meeting of the Benjamin Britten Debating Society was held after school on 8 November under the stewardship of Mr Sweetman, Miss Stanley and Mr Mullender. Twelve scholars from different year groups attended and have been preparing for a debate on efforts needed to tackle global warming. The society aims to develop confidence in public speaking and teach the skills needed to win a debate. All scholars are welcome to join when the society reconvenes in the new year.

And in Other News...

Britten Day: On 22 and 23 November, events were held to commemorate the birthday of our namesake, Benjamin Britten. Year 7 scholars were treated to a recital of two of Britten's piano compositions, made when he was a teenager in Lowestoft in the 1920s, played by Miss Phillips (Music) and arranged by Miss Fuschillo (Music). On 23 November, a group of scholars who have achieved well in lessons participated in the annual Britten Tour. This event takes in a number of sites which were important to Britten, before culminating in the tradition of laying of flowers on his grave in Aldeburgh churchyard, something which has taken place annually since the school opened in 1977. Scholars were able to see Britten's family home in Lowestoft, Snape Maltings concert hall, Maggi Hambling's memorial to him on Aldeburgh beach and John Piper's stained glass window in Aldeburgh Church. Lunch break was taken on Aldeburgh beach in unusually sunny conditions, allowing scholars to practice their stone skimming techniques. Thanks are extended to Charlie Gould (10DM), Olivia Payne (10DM), Alara Kilic (9NM), Shania Ashley (7AM), Maxxwell Gibbs (7TF), George Eglington (7DB), Thea Pritchard (7JG) and Matilda Richardson (7AM) for their excellent behaviour on the day.

<u>Awareness Presentations</u>: The stage group 'Alter Ego' presented a dramatic and thought-provoking play to all scholars in Years 8, 9, 10 and 11 on 24 November about the dangers of involvement with county lines drug trafficking. Scholars were informed about the dangers presented by County Lines and the actions the police are taking to combat this criminal enterprise across the UK.

Fire Safety Workshop: On 30 November all year groups were able to participate in 20 minute workshops on the topic of fire safety. This event was hosted by firefighters from the local Bluewatch and scholars were provided with many pieces of important information relating to basic fire safety in and around the home.

My Homework: A reminder to scholars, parents and carers that the updated school website went live on 18 November with the 'My Homework' link. This is a one-stop shop where parents and scholars can find all homework resources set by their teachers from the comfort of their own home.

<u>Stress Workshops</u>: As part of the School's commitment to the health and wellbeing of children and young people in its care, scholars in Year 9 were able to attend workshops led by Anjali Stringer on how to deal with stress and anxiety from September through to December. These sessions were well-attended and it is hoped will have conveyed useful information to all those who took part.

Christmas Performance: The Christmas Spectacular was held on the evenings of 14, 15 and 16 December. Excitement surrounding the event had been high for many weeks and tickets sold out within six minutes of going on sale. To deal with demand, an additional performance was added on 13 December. Scholars from across all year groups practised for several weeks to ensure the performance went faultlessly and Miss Breen (Drama) was very pleased with the results and congratulates all who took part and thanks all those who came to watch.

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award: Miss Banns is delighted to announce that the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award has been re-instated under her stewardship. Scholars from across the year groups were invited to join, with many completing their application forms within the first few days after the scheme was launched. The Duke of Edinburgh scheme has a long and successful history at Benjamin Britten and it is hoped that the new intake of participants will derive great enjoyment from its activities.





Sign of Four Trial: On 16 December, two English classes visited the School Library to watch the trial of Jonathan Small, whose exploits are the subject of the Year 10 GCSE English Literature text, 'The Sign of Four'. Jack Eglington (10DM) took the part of Small, who stood trial for theft, absconding from prison, manslaughter and being in possession of government documents. Counsel for the Prosecution was ably provided by Kitson Smithers (10SB) and Saul Wisher (10OR), whilst Defence Counsel was led by Darcey Bean (10AB) and Joseph Boor (10OR). Evidence was presented by both sides to a jury of over twenty scholars, who listened patiently to several witnesses and cross-examinations before delivering their verdict of guilty to three of the four charges. Congratulations to all who participated and to the jury for behaving so well throughout the session.
