Main Feature: Year 8 Paris Trip

From 14 -16 March, 80 scholars from Year 8 spent three wonderful days in on a trip to Paris. On the first day, the group visited the iconic Eiffel Tower where they enjoyed beautiful panoramic views of the city, whilst the bravest amongst them ascended the summit, which stands a dizzying 906FT above the bustling city streets. The afternoon was spent enjoying a guided coach tour of Paris, learning facts about some of the world's most famous monuments such as the Notre Dame Cathedral, Arc de triomphe and the Louvre museum. On their second day, scholars visited L'hôtel des Invalides where they admired the beautiful architecture and saw Napoleon's tomb. This was followed by an invigorating boat trip along the River Seine. Scholars concluded their trip with a day and a half at Disneyland where the Tower of Terror and Avengers rides proved popular for our fearless pupils. 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Mobile Phone Policy

Scholars are not permitted to be in possession of a mobile phone, or any electronic device, during the school day.

Any phone or device brought into school must be deposited with the relevant Year Teams promptly upon arrival where it will be held in secure storage.

The phone/device can then be collected at 3:15pm.

The School reserves the right to confiscate any mobile phone/device found in possession of a scholar during the school day, including at break and lunchtime, and to only return the phone/device at 3:15pm to a parent or carer.



If parents or carers need to urgently contact their child, they should do so by communicating with the main school office on (01502) 582 312, whereupon a message will be relayed immediately.



Bicycle Safety

The School strongly recommends that scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a bicycle helmet. Bicycle locks are also recommended.

A reminder that bicycles should NOT be ridden on the school site.

All cyclists are reminded of the importance of careful and considerate use of the public roads, particularly to and from school, when vehicle traffic increases.

In law, a bicycle is regarded as a vehicle and should be used responsibly.

Any cyclist can be stopped by the Police for riding a bicycle recklessly on a road or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner under the Road Traffic Act (1991).



The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is £2,500.



Trip News

Silverstone Trip: On 11 January, 55 scholars from Year 10 travelled with the maths department to Silverstone Interactive Museum to learn more about mathematics and science within motorsport, and discover more about the career opportunities within the automotive industry. During the day, scholars took part in a STEM workshop, where they explored the technology, design and science of racing cars and also looked at possible career options within STEM and motor racing. Scholars had the opportunity to handle



various parts of racing and mechanical equipment, including carbon fibre wings and used race tyres from the cars of famous F1 drivers Max Verstappen and Mark Webber. This was followed by a Heritage Track Trail, which allowed scholars to walk along the length of the original Silverstone race track, as well as see the views from different stands around the circuit. Along with a photo opportunity to sit inside a real racing car, all scholars explored the interactive museum, which combines history, interactive experiences including a Scalextric model of the Silverstone track and amazing memorabilia from over 70 years of motorsport. Scholars and staff alike had a thoroughly enjoyable and educational day, and we look forward to running similar trips in the future.

Harry Potter Trip: Before dawn on 9 February, forty Year 7 scholars departed Benjamin Britten to make the long trek to the most magical (literally!) place in all of the United Kingdom: The Studio Tour of Harry Potter. After an arduous 3-hour bus journey, students were immediately greeted with a grand entrance lined in gigantic replicas of character wands and Wizard Chess pieces, which welcomed them into the main building. Their tour began with a filmmaking lesson, in which they got to learn more about crafting a screenplay before being able to draft one of their own using actual set pieces from the Harry Potter films. They were also able to get a close-up look at some of the most famous costumes and props from the franchise and ask some fantastic behind-the-scenes questions (no, The Cursed Child is not being made into a film, unfortunately). After a brief break in which they got to hang out with a Hungarian Horntail, scholars were then allowed to go into the studio tour itself, which began in the Great Hall with a bang! as representations of the Weasley twins recreated disrupting the O.W.L.s scene. After lots of fireworks and music, they were led into the labyrinth of sets and costumes behind the scenes, including: The Gryffindor common room, Dumbledore's office, the Weasley kitchens, and the Forbidden Forest. After some broom practice, wand lessons, and a terrifying encounter with Aragog, scholars settled down for some well-earned butterbeer and lunch. The day closed with lots of happy purchases and some very happy witches and wizards returning to their muggle school.

Holocaust Memorial Day:

On Saturday 27 January, Head Girl L. Picken and Head Boy A. Clark accompanied Mr Mullender (careers) to Lowestoft Railway Station to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day and Lowestoft's role in the Kindertransport, the evacuation of unaccompanied Jewish refugee children from the Nazis. The event was introduced by Cllr. Sonia Barker, the Mayor of Lowestoft, who recounted her experiences of meeting Holocaust survivors during her career as a history teacher at Benjamin Britten School between 1993 and 2003. Mr Peter Aldous (MP for Lowestoft and Waveney) gave a speech about the significance of Lowestoft in rescuing Jewish children from the Holocaust and the importance of seeking political solutions to contemporary global problems likely to result in bloodshed. Students from



neighbouring high schools recited excerpts of Anne Frank's diary whilst A. Clark and L. Picken read a poem entitled 'Freedom' by Helen Jackson. Over fifty members of the public attended the event which was concluded with a one minute silence and the laying of a wreath on the railway platform. Mr Mullender extends his appreciation to our scholars and to Mr Temple for giving up his Saturday morning to drive the school minibus.

Ambulance Service Workshop:



After deliberation, the judges awarded OUTSTANDING, the highest grade possible. The judges also made special mention of Year 11 guitarist O. Gibbs who was noted as the most talented musician of the night. Further to their credit, and in recognition of their tireless work in rehearsals, the band also won the Music Festival Cup which is awarded to the best band across all of the festival events. As a lasting tribute to their success, the cup will be engraved with the name of the School. Mrs Breen (performing arts) congratulates all who have worked on the project and Mr Chapman (music) extends his congratulations for this outstanding achievement in their final performance at Benjamin Britten School.

The New Britten Band:

The new Britten Band performed at the Norfolk County Music Festival and were awarded **Highly Commended Performance Plus** (this being the second-highest award on offer). The New Band had the most amazing time and are all talking about winning the cup when they are in Year 11.



<u>LAMDA Results</u>: The latest set of exam results from LAMDA have been published and show excellent results across the board for our scholars. Once scholars achieve a pass at Grade 6 they can earn UCAS points which will help with any future application to university. As more points have been awarded for Merit and Distinction this year, the school's external assessor has indicated that some of the younger scholars may be able to reach diploma level if they maintain their current level of work. The Performing Arts Department has also had two scholars take an exam in Verse and Prose for the first time.

a message from Mr Flanagan


