Main Feature: Royal Norfolk Show Trip

On 27 June, **100 scholars from Year 9 were able to attend the Royal Norfolk Show in Norwich as part of their careers programme,** under the supervision of Dr Wright (STEM), Mrs Norton (Pastoral Head of Year 9), Mrs Wright (English) and Mr Mullender (careers). The group was given a series of questions to ask potential future employers in the STEM Village, where a large number of exhibitors from the technology and engineering sector were on show. Companies that scholars were able to speak with ranged from offshore energy, construction, aircraft repairs, landscape mapping and power distribution. Later in the day, scholars were allowed to view stalls and exhibits outside the STEM Village where many visited the livestock tent. Here they were able to see fine examples of award-winning rare breed animals, including sheep, goats, and pigs. Each animal had been meticulously prepared for the show with many taking home several awards. The group also had the opportunity to speak with two former BBMA scholars who were volunteers for the Royal Horticultural Society on the subject of careers in agriculture. As is befitting of the Royal Norfolk Show, Prince Edward, Duke of Edinburgh, visited the event and had his photo taken by Mrs Wright who was momentarily mistaken for a member of the Press by show stewards. Scholars were impeccably behaved and were a credit to the school.

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Mobile Phone Policy

Scholars are not permitted to be in possession of a mobile phone, or any electronic device, during the school day.

Any phone or device brought into school must be deposited with the relevant Year Teams promptly upon arrival where it will be held in secure storage. The phone/device can then be collected at 3:15pm.

The School reserves the right to confiscate any mobile phone/device found in possession of a scholar during the school day, including at break and lunchtime, and to only return the phone/device between 3:15-4:00pm to a parent or carer.

Bicycle Safety

The School strongly recommends that scholars cycling to and from school are equipped with a bicycle helmet. Bicycle locks are also recommended.

Bicycles are NOT to be ridden on the school site.

All cyclists are reminded of the importance of careful and considerate use of the public roads, particularly to and from school, when vehicle traffic increases.

In law, a bicycle is regarded as a vehicle and should be used responsibly.

Any cyclist can be **stopped by the Police for riding a bicycle recklessly on a road** or in a dangerous, careless or inconsiderate manner under the Road Traffic Act (1991).



The maximum fine that a court can impose in a case of dangerous cycling is £2,500.



Trip News

UEA Chemistry Festival: On 23 May, Dr Wright (Science/STEM) led 10 Year 9 scholars on a trip to the Chemistry Festival at UEA in Norwich to listen to keynote speakers about careers within the chemistry sector. The group was also challenged to complete a practical chemistry task, namely the synthesis of Aspirin. Well done to all those on the trip; their behaviour and collaborative thinking were a credit to the school.



Year 9 Iceland Trip: Forty Year 9 scholars had the exciting opportunity of travelling to Iceland with the school from 8-12 July for an introduction to the powerful geology of this incredible country. Scholars visited a geothermal hydroplant to witness first-hand how Iceland generates its own electricity and how this efficient green energy system works in practice. The group later visited the lava and sulphur fields in south west Iceland and were also able to visit Geldingadilir Grindavik , the most recent volcanic eruption in the country where the lava was still flowing. The tour of the lava fields concluded with a surprise visit to the presidential house of Iceland's president, Guoni Johanesson. The trip concluded with a visit to the ice caves at the Perlan Centre and a stop in the capital city of Reykjavik. *Pictured below are some of the highlights from the trip*.


